If you purchase an All-Access pass, you **must** arrive a minimum of 15 minutes before each screening's scheduled start time to gain access to the theatre. All holds for passes will be released at the 15-minute mark. All entry is subject to capacity.

Rush Policy

Screenings for which advance tickets are no longer available will be eligible for rush sales. Any leftover tickets will be available to those in the Rush Line 15 minutes before the screenings begin. The line forms up to two hours before show time. Rush ticket sales are cash only.

The National Gallery of Canada is wheelchair accessible and welcomes service animals and guide dogs.

Listening to Angela, a Black lesbian feminist who is rousing a crowd, we understand that, no, this particular revolution wasn't televised. Rather, from out of the shadows, it was hugged, chanted, marched and danced into existence.

Our Dance of Revolution tells the story of how Black queer folks in Toronto faced every adversity, from invisibility to police brutality, and rose up to become a vibrant community. Unsettled: Seeking Refuge in America

As new leadership in America continues to demonize immigrants, *Unsettled* reveals the untold stories of LGBT folks who have fled intense persecution from their home countries and who are resettling in the United States.

Subhi, a gay Syrian refugee, who, having survived multiple death threats from Islamic terrorists, finds his voice as a leader for refugee rights in the U.S. Cheyenne and Mari, a lesbian couple from Angola, who, having faced brutal harassment from family and neighbors, seek uncertain asylum through the American immigration courts. And Junior, who fled from the Congo, struggles to find even basic housing and livelihood while exploring a more fluid gender identity.

Set in Oakland, We Are the Radical Monarchs documents an alternative movement to the Girl Scouts. The Ground Beneath My Feet is a masterful thriller that looks at the intersection of mental health and womanhood through the experiences of Lola (Valerie Pachner), an ambitious workaholic on the verge of a nervous breakdown.

A ruthless and skilled consultant, Lola is on the brink of her dream promotion. Everything is put in jeopardy, however, when her sister, who lives with paranoid schizophrenia, attempts suicide. Changing the Game takes us beyond sensationalistic headlines to really get to know three trans athletes who are fighting to compete in school athletics.

Mack, Sarah, and Andraya have lots in common, they are all hard working transgender teen athletes who excel in their sports. But because state laws are so wildly inconsistent they experience some major differences. Mack in Texas, despite being a boy, is forced to wrestle against girls. Sarah in New Hampshire faces a law saying she must have gender confirmation surgery in order to ski against other girls. Andraya in Connecticut is able to race against girls but faces hateful discrimination.

A Dog Barking at the Moon

Ever since she was young, Huang Xiaoyu has been cheering for her parents' divorce, particularly in light of evidence that her father might be gay. Arriving home from the U.S. to have her first child, Western husband at her side, Xiaoyu already seems demoralized. Her father is cheerful but absent, and her mother is a bundle of nerves and disgruntlement. Though her father's was less well kept, as the curtain is pulled back we see that secrets most definitely run in the family.

Telling her story over different periods of time, Xiang invites the viewer to be a fly on the wall as astutely observed moments unfold in the history of a family that has barely been able to keep up appearances.

In an age of dating apps, *End of the Century* begs the question if our hookups are just random encounters time and again, or is something else at work that connects us?

An Argentinian man from New York and a Spanish man from Berlin hook up by chance while in Barcelona. What seems like a one-night encounter between two strangers becomes an epic, decades-spanning relationship, which writer-director Lucio Castro depicts in a nonlinear fashion throwing time and space into question as we invest in the physical and emotional connections on screen.


